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
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# 2015 ANNUAL REPORT ROWAN COUNTY LITERACY COUNCIL

## 2015 in Review – Adult Literacy


### STUDENTS IN 2015

- We served 22 students, who logged 161 hours
- 13 were new students, 9 were continuing students
- 27% report their long-term goal is to obtain a GED
- 41% report their long-term goal is to obtain employment or move up in the workforce
- 59% are African American, 36% are Caucasian, 1% are Hispanic, and 4% listed Other


Adult Literacy instruction is designed to expand the educational opportunities for adults and to establish programs that will enable adults to acquire basic skills necessary to function in society and allow them to secure training that will enable them to become more employable, productive and responsible citizens as well as allowing them to continue their education to at least the level of completion of secondary school.

In 2015 we began using the CASAS testing software to better determine the level students should start at and to continually measure progress throughout the program.


## The English as a Second Language Program

served 54 students in 2015. Adults from 10 different countries speaking 7 different languages walked through our doors with the common goal of improving their English language skills.


