BINGO BLENDS

Learning vowels and consonants for reading can be a challenge, and bingo can be a useful tool for practicing difference aspects of language. For example, Bingo can be used to practice consonant blends:

- Select the consonant blends you want your student to work on, like bl, br, fr, st, fl, etc.
- Create two bingo cards (five columns across and five columns down).
- One the first card, mark the "Free" space in the center, then write a different consonant blend in each of the spaces.
- Write the same blends on the second card, but put them in different spaces. This card will be for yourself.
- Select words that start with each blend used on the bingo cards. Write these 24 words on separate pieces of paper, and then put them face down in a pile.
- Ask the student to pick a word from the pile. They should read it aloud and give the sound of the blend.
- Have the student cover the blend on their card. Whoever gets five blends in a row first, wins!

You can also use bingo with digraphs, vowel sounds, and new vocabulary words.
