#### TEACHING SMALL TALK FOR CITIZEN-SHIP AND LIFE

When a candidate for citizenship arrives at the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services office, their test begins the moment they walk in the door. While most people know about the civics portion of the naturalization test, there is also an English language component. During the interview, candidates must demonstrate an understanding of the English language, including the ability to read, write, and speak basic English.

A candidate's ability to speak and understand English is determined by the USCIS officer conducting their interview. Therefore, the interview begins once introductions are made. Although students are not required to be adept with small talk to pass the test, a lack of response could lead an examiner to believe that the applicant is not proficient enough in English to pass the test.

Even if your English as a Second Language student isn't studying for the citizenship test, explicitly teaching small talk can help your student better navigate situations they may encounter at work, at their child's school, at the doctor's office, or out and about.

Here are some small talk phrases that are good to cover with your ESL student:

- Greetings: "Good morning/afternoon." "How are you doing?" "How's it going?" "How was your weekend?"
- Compliments: "I like your (jewelry/shoes/handbag)."
- Weather: "What's the weather like (out there/outside)?" "Is it still (raining/snowing)?" "Is it getting (hot/windy) out there?"
- Transportation: "How did you get here?" "Did it take you long to get here?" "Did you have any trouble finding the office?" "Did you have any trouble with parking?" "Did you run into traffic?"
- Waiting Room/Companions: "Have you been waiting here long?"
  "What time did you get here?" "Is anyone here with you today?"
- Citizenship Related: "Why are you here today?" "Did you study for the citizenship test?" "Are you ready for your test/interview?" "Why do you want to be a citizen?"

Keep in mind that a lot of phrases mean the same thing, but can be said in different ways.

Navigating small talk is something that native English speakers do without much thought. By preparing our students to engage with small talk, we can help them make better first impressions and improve their confidence in their English skills.
