# NEW APP IS TOOLKIT FOR TUTORS

Earlier this year, RCLC rolled out a new tool that tutors can use to communicate with the office, assist their students, report volunteer hours, and stay up-to-date with the latest news. A free smartphone app for iPhone or Android devices can be downloaded from the App store or Google Play store by simply typing in "Rowan County Literacy Council."

The app connects to the Literacy Council's social media accounts and event calendar, provides direct links to phone, email, website, newsletters, donation page, and organization photos, and also provides many useful teaching aids at a touch, such as translation tools, dictionary links, e-books, and more. The app also streamlines the reporting of volunteer hours. A push notification feature allows staff to alert tutors to last minute happenings such as closures for inclement weather.
