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RCLC ADDS PART-TIME TUTOR

Over the past year, the Rowan County Literacy Council has seen a sharp uptick in demand for our services. In 2022, 34 students registered for the first time for our adult programs. So far in 2023, 48 students have signed up for our adult programs, which translates to a 41% increase.

It's only August.

With this increase in demand, and an ever-expanding waitlist, RCLC decided to add a part-time tutor to our staff, and luckily, we already had a great candidate on our roster.

A graduate of Duke University, Mathias de Comarmond joined the Literacy Council as a volunteer tutor in 2021. Since then, he has worked diligently with his student to help her earn her GED and increase her English skills.

His hard work and dedication in helping his student succeed earned Mathias one of the "Rookie of the Year" awards for 2021.

During 2022, Rowan County Literacy Council tutors volunteered over 3,015 hours helping fellow Rowan County residents improve their literacy skills. On Monday, August 7, 2023, RCLC volunteers were honored at a celebratory event in Rowan Public Library's Stanback Auditorium to recognize their many achievements.

The Literacy Council presents plaques to tutors who log their first 100 hours and gives brass plates for each additional set of 100 hours worked. The following tutors were given plaques for having notched their first 100 hours: Ethel Bamberg-Revis, Linda Bartlett, Helen Kichefski, and Toni Teeter.

Other veteran tutors were honored for additional hours during 2022, as follows:




IN MEMORIAM: ROBERT MYERS

Longtime friend of literacy, Reverend Robert Myers, passed away in July. Robert is survived by his wife of 66 years, Mrs. Carolyn Myers, who served as an RCLC Board member, tutor, and tutor trainer from 1985 until 2018.

While Robert is most known for his volunteer work at the NC Transportation Museum and Trinity Oaks, he was also a regular volunteer for RCLC events. Robert logged in over 120 volunteer hours, and volunteered at every Scrabble Scramble fundraiser from its beginning in 2003 until 2016. Robert also participated in other RCLC events, often providing an opening invocation for the Tutor Appreciation dinner and other meetings.

We are thankful to Robert for his years of service in the community, and we extend our heartfelt condolences to his friends and family.



2023 ANNUAL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

This year's annual meeting was held in conjunction with our Tutor Appreciation luncheon.

During 2022, the Rowan County Literacy Council served 16 Adult Basic Education students, 63 adult English as a Second Language students, and 84 Youth Literacy students.

When students enroll in our adult programs, they take a test using the CASAS testing system. After 50 hours of instruction, they are reassessed. In 2022, our adult students increased an average of 4.8 points and 66% of re-assessed adult students increased their abilities by 1 or more grade levels.

2022 also saw the addition of the Spanglish Conversations class at Ruffy-Holmes Senior Center. Spanglish gives adults interested in learning English or Spanish the opportunity to engage in conversations with native speakers.

In the 2021-2022 school year, 86% of elementary students in our Youth program gained 2 or more reading levels, with the average gain being 4.5 reading levels.

Additionally, through a generous Youth Literacy materials grant from the Dollar General Foundation, we were able to provide 50 students with bookcases and vouchers to build their home libraries.

Overall, our dedicated tutors volunteered over 3,015 hours during 2022, equivalent to \$95,893 of in-kind support. Our work would not be possible without the ongoing support of our tutors, donors, funders, and community partners. Thank you for helping make 2022 a success.
