Previous Tutor and Board Member Dorothy "Dot" Hurley passed away in November. Dot was a staunch supporter of RCLC, and the second ever winner of the Catherine Safrit award in 1996. A lifelong educator, Mrs. Hurley

taught in public schools for 32 years and continued her passion for education by volunteering with the Literacy Council. Dot joined the Literacy Council as a tutor in 1991. By 1994, she was serving as a tutor trainer and board member.

Dot was an advocate for literacy in the community and wrote News for Adult New Readers in the *Salisbury Post*. In her 25 years of service, Dot logged around 2,602 tutoring hours and countless other volunteer hours.

When working with a student, one of the most rewarding things is witnessing that "lightbulb" moment.

While the vast majority of RCLC Youth Literacy program takes place in Rowan-Salisbury Schools through our partnership with Communities in Schools, some tutors meet with Youth students over Zoom or inperson at the library.

Recently, one of these Youth Literacy students has made enormous strides in her reading levels; jumping the equivalent of 8 reading levels in just three months.

"I could see "it" as it was happening," said tutor Jennifer Welch.

Not only has this student made academic strides, but she is learning to enjoy reading.

This was confirmed during tutoring one day, when the student looked at Jennifer and said, "You know, I really love reading."
