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RCLC ADDS SECOND PROGRAM COORDINATOR


When Miguel Bustos Rivero bounced into the RCLC office in November to sign up for oneon-one English language tutoring, it was hard not to conjure up an image of Tigger bounding into the room to greet Piglet and Pooh.

Sunny outlook? Check. High energy? Check.

After a brief time on the waiting list, Miguel, a native of Venezuela, began working with

tutor Joel Scott. Miguel had a good command of written English, but needed help with conversation, vocabulary, idioms, and pronunciation. His tutor worked with him to expand his vocabulary, and helped him start preparing for his first goal, getting his NC driver's license.

During the time they worked together, Miguel also received his work authorization from US Citizenship & Immigration Services (USCIS). Joel helped Miguel navigate the process of applying for work in his new country.



As it happened, there was a job opportunity quite close at hand. The Literacy Council had been planning to hire a second parttime program coordinator to handle the Adult Program, after bring in Betsy Hood in January to focus on the Youth Program. Our adult program is roughly 75-80% ESL students and 20-25% Adult Basic Education (ABE) students. Most of the ESL students are Spanish-speakers, so we hoped to hire a native Spanish speaker for

the position. Miguel decided to apply for the position and his tutor helped him draft his resume and cover letter and prepare for the interview.

The rest is history.

Did it hurt that Miguel has a law degree and is an IT whiz? Not a bit. Miguel joined the RCLC team in late March and has leapt enthusiastically into his new role. If you are in the library on Thursdays or Fridays, please come say hello.

SHOP 'TIL YOU DROP FOR RCLC

Pro tip: AmazonSmile is an easy way to chip in to help out your favorite charitable organizations. AmazonSmile will donate 0.5% of the purchase price of eligible purchases made via AmazonSmile to whatever charitable organization you specify. (Hint, hint, pick us!)

To reach the AmazonSmile site, simply type Smile.Amazon.com into your web browser. Once you sign up for the program, it will connect with your existing Amazon account, so your shopping cart, registries, and account settings will transfer over. If you're an Amazon Prime member, those benefits will transfer as well. You can also access AmazonSmile on the retailer's shopping app. Navigate to the app settings, tap on "AmazonSmile," and follow the instructions to start generating those microdonations!

Note that AmazonSmile specifies "eligible" purchases because not every item on the site qualifies for donations. There are tens of millions of eligible products, but some items, such as recurring subscribe-and-save purchases, are not.

The Rowan County Literacy Council has again received grant funding from the **Blanche and Julian Robertson Family** Foundation in support of both our Adult and Youth Programs. The Robertson Foundation was created in 1997 as a charitable entity dedicated to making positive change in Salisbury by addressing social issues, nurturing positive relationships, increasing opportunities for atrisk youth, and improving educational opportunities, among other priorities. Funds will be used to continue to recruit and train new tutors, provide educational materials, and help us provide the personalized one-on-one tutoring for adults and youths that is so effective in

changing lives for the better. We are honored to have been chosen as a 2021 grant recipient.

RCLC has also received a 2021 **National Book Fund** grant which provides our adult literacy and basic education programs with materials to help teach adults to read or master English. These materials enable us to provide high-quality leveled workbooks and teacher's guides to our students and tutors, as well as picture dictionaries, GED study materials, short novels created with new readers in mind, and materials to help English Language Learners tackle a tricky new language.

IN MEMORIAM: LIZ HARRY

Tutor Liz Harry passed away in March after a bout with cancer. Liz started volunteering for RCLC in 2018 and worked with an ABE student, an ESL student, and numerous elementary-school students during her time as a tutor. She was a mentor to her students, always supporting them while encouraging them to reach for their goals. She modeled perseverance as she continued to tutor even during her chemotherapy sessions.

Early in her career, Liz worked as a teacher in South Carolina, but soon decided that the peripatetic life of a flight attendant was more to her liking. Liz loved to read, ride horses, ski, garden, and travel, and so in retirement, those became her favored pastimes. She began tutoring shortly after moving to Salisbury from Virginia.

Always energetic, illness did not slow Liz down and she continued to tutor, travel, and enjoy life fully. The Literacy Council is grateful for the dedication, selflessness, and generosity of spirit that Liz displayed during her time with the organization.
