We added new tutors in our Adult Literacy Program as well as in our Youth Literacy program. Kimberly and Madeline are college students at Pfeiffer University and NC State, respectively. Amber works for Rowan County government by day and tutors her student in the evening. IN MEMORIAM: FORMER BOARD MEMBER CLYDE HARRISS

With great sadness, we share the news of the passing of our long-time tutor, trainer, and board member, Clyde Harriss, on November 14, 2020. Mr. Harriss joined the Literacy Council in 1990, and volunteered thousands of hours during his 19 years of service. He started as a tutor and over the years he worked with many ESL and ABE students, who appreciated his unfailing support and kindness. Next he became a certified ProLiteracy Tutor-Trainer, responsible for conducting periodic tutor training workshops and attending literacy conferences. Mr. Harriss later served as a board member, sharing his business acumen and leadership skills. In recognition of his extensive service, he was awarded the Catherine Bernhardt Safrit Award for Extraordinary Volunteer Service in 2001. After "retiring" from active tutoring, he continued to help out with RCLC's community events and fundraisers, never missing a Scrabble Scramble, where he cheerfully greeted players and sold raffle tickets. Clyde Harriss was everything we could have asked for in a volunteer and more.

IN MEMORIAM: TUTOR RAY COSTELLO

We are saddened to report the passing of tutor Ray Costello on November 5, 2020. Ray had been in declining health for the past several months, but retained his characteristic sense of humor and good nature throughout his illness.

Ray joined the Literacy Council in 2016 and quickly became one of our most dedicated tutors. He normally worked with two students at a time, and met with them each twice a week, racking up many hours along the way. He worked mainly with English-speaking Adult Basic Education (ABE) students, but his last student was an ESL student, which was a new tutoring experience for him. He found that he thoroughly enjoyed working with his ESL student and the two forged a wonderful connection.

Ray faithfully attended RCLC training and social events, saying "anything for a free lunch!" and was always interested in finding new techniques to help his students. He became a friend and mentor to many of his students, and was genuinely invested in their success. We are grateful for his service and commitment to literacy.

CAVALIERS AFTER HOURS (CAH) PROGRAM UNDERWAY

A few weeks ago, our partners at Communities in Schools (CIS) looped us in on a request from North Rowan High School. The school was looking for tutors to work with students during a special program called "Cavs After Hours."

Assistant Principal Rebecca Rolfsmeyer explained that due to the challenges presented by the pandemic and the difficulties some students have with remote learning, that many NRHS students had fallen behind in one or more classes.

School administrators had prepared packets for each student which contained assignments that were pending. They knew exactly what needed to be done but needed manpower to help students get through the material. That's where we came in.

We sent up the bat signal to our existing pool of tutors and also sent an appeal into the community for new tutors. The response was immediate and overwhelming. We had almost 20 tutors sign up to help, including six new tutors (see p. 2 for details). We worked with CIS to on-board the new volunteers and then jumped right in.

Tutors are working in two formats: in-person on campus

and remotely over Zoom. The subject matter varies from Romeo and Juliet to balancing algebraic equations...and everything in between. Civics, US History, English, Design, Math, Spanish, Physical Science, and Physics are just some of the classes our tutors have tackled with the students.

The tutor pool includes many subject matter experts including retired educators Jenny Hubbard, Char Molrine and Thomas Long, as well as many others with advanced degrees in English, History, Chemistry, and other relevant subjects. Long also happens to be a proud NRHS class of '83 alumnus who said he "wanted to help the next generation of North students enjoy school and be successful, especially since this year has been so challenging due to COVID."

Principal Meredith Williams said, "The Literacy Council have been a huge boost for our students who were struggling with the lack of structure of remote learning. The support of the tutors has helped many of our students gain critical credits towards graduation as well as a more positive outlook on their remote learning experience."

The program will continue next semester and will be expanded so that tutors may also meet with students during regular school hours. Go Cavs!
