NEW TUTORS COME ONLINE

As the COVID-19 pandemic drags on, people of all ages are seeking ways to be active and productive from home. For those just entering or soon to enter the workforce, volunteering can be particularly important. Tutoring can help young people build experience and acquire marketable skills. We have had several collegeage tutors come online in recent weeks.

Amaiya Kerns is a college student (currently on hiatus from school) who is interested in languages and learning about different cultures. She has been studying Korean independently for five years! She has past experience volunteering with refugee and immigrant high school students. Amaiya completed her RCLC training and has been paired with an ESL student. The two are meeting over Zoom.

THE UNEXPECTED UPSIDES OF COVID

COVID-19 has thrown us many curveballs since March. To be perfectly honest, most of these curveballs have been unpleasant: schools closed, trips cancelled, plans dashed. But a few unexpected positives have also emerged.

One example is that tutoring over Zoom allows tutors and students to be anywhere. And we do mean *anywhere*. Traditionally, tutors and students had to live within driving distance of Salisbury in order to meet in person. Meeting times were constrained by library hours and availability of meeting rooms. If someone was traveling, or moved away, tutoring stopped. This is no longer the case. In recent months, we have certified new tutors from Goldsboro to Cullowhee. We have tutored from porches at the lake and from decks in the mountains. We have conducted tutoring sessions with students in cars en route to grandma's house in New York, or driving to the Outer Banks. As long as there is an internet connection, learning can continue.

In January 2020, we overhauled our tutor training process to make it more user friendly and take the process fully online. This was fortuitous, because we have been able to seamlessly continue to training and certifying new tutors during the shutdown. Virtual tutoring enables us to work with out-of-area volunteers even though our student base remains local.

In the past, inclement weather also derailed some sessions, especially during the winter. Virtual tutoring solves this problem, eliminating the need to venture out in bad weather, and increasing the comfort and safety of our students and tutors.

In this way, COVID has freed us from some constraints. While we won't ever jettison face-to-face tutoring, COVID has expanded our capabilities in ways that will far outlast the pandemic.

RESOURCES FOR REMOTE TUTORING

Screen sharing is the best feature of Zoom for tutoring sessions. Tutors and students can safely view the same content in real time, even making on-the-fly notes or changes. Below are several sites that have excellent content for virtual lessons.

Newsela.com has scalable news and current events articles. Lexile level can be adjusted up or down based on your student's level.

"Learn English Through Story with Subtitles" on YouTube provides narrated classic short stories by Poe, Wilde, and other famous authors. Students can read along and listen to the story. Narration speed can be adjusted to help ESL students keep up.

Vocabulary.com is an excellent resource for building and retaining new vocabulary. Users can create personal lists of vocabulary words and the site will generate quizzes to reinforce learning. Users can also compete in 10-question team competition with users from around the world.

5minuteenglish.com and englishgrammar101.com are good resources for drilling down into specific points of grammar.

SAFER-AT-HOME ORDER EXTENDED

Governor Roy Cooper has extended the "Safer-at Home" Phase 2 order for non-essential businesses in the state of North Carolina until at least September 11. This replaces the previous order which ended August 7. As a result of the ongoing threat posed by the COVID-19 pandemic, the Rowan Public Library, and our offices, remain closed.

Although in-person tutoring is suspended, tutors are strongly encouraged to find other ways to work with their students, including Zoom, Facetime, phone, or email. While we don't have daily access to our office, we can get in from time to time to retrieve materials. If you have a request for workbooks or other materials from the office, please write to lharry@rcliteracy.org for assistance. In addition, if you need help identifying online content for virtual sessions, please let us know and we will be happy to assist.
