COMMUNITIES IN SCHOOLS EXPANDS

Students in Rowan-Salisbury Schools returned to school this month, and we're already thinking about our Youth Programs this fall. This year, Communities in Schools is expanding to offer services in Henderson Independent High School and Southeast Middle School, bringing the total number of RSS schools with CIS support up to 10.

Volunteers in our Youth Literacy program go through initial training and background checks before being paired with students. The schools evaluate test scores to identify students who are at risk for falling behind. Volunteers work with students at least once a week to build literacy skills.

NEW AND IMPROVED- SCRABBLE SCRAMBLE RETURNS

After two years of covid-related postponements, the 17th Annual Scrabble Scramble is set for Thursday, September 29th at 6:00 pm. The Scrabble Scramble is a team endeavor, with each team aiming to build the highest score by using the allotted tiles. This year will contain all of the fun of team Scrabble, with some new rules to keep things competitive.

Notable rule changes include:

- Teams will be limited to up to 6 participants.
- Each table will have an Official who will facilitate play.
- The Official will count out 50 random tiles from the bag for the team to use. Up to 10 additional RANDOM tiles from the bag may be purchased for \$5 each from the table Official.
- Peeks at the dictionary (one word per peek) may be purchased for \$2 each from the table Official.

With these new rules, we hope to keep the fun and excitement of Scrabble Scramble going through all three rounds. Tickets are \$30 each (\$20 for tutors) and include gameplay, hors d'oeuvres, desserts, and raffle prizes.

YOUR BRAIN ON LANGUAGES

While speaking multiple languages is definitely an advantage, sometimes things can get mixed up. These mistakes can actually shed light on how our brains work.

Research into how multilingual people juggle more than one language shows that when a multilingual person wants to speak, the languages that they know can be active at the same time, even if they are just trying to use one language. In other words, if an English-Spanish bilingual speaker wants to say, "blue" both the English "blue" and the Spanish "azul" are activated in the brain.

This double-activation can lead to some mix-ups, and cause intrusions in not only vocabulary, but also grammar and accent. It can also make it more difficult for monolingual adults to learn a new language. When trying to speak a new language, the old language can pop up and make it more difficult to use a new language.
